During Term 3 I will be acting Principal of Mirboo North Secondary College while Mrs. Karen Lanyon is on leave. Mr. Nic Ryan and Mrs. Kay Chandler will act as Assistant Principals during this time.

Several key events have happened at MNSC over the last few weeks in a term that will prove to be exceptionally busy.

We welcomed 13 Chinese exchange students and their Assistant Principal Mr. Zheng Yu, to the college for 3 days. The students were from our sister school at Chiangsu No 1, Jiangshu Provence in China.

Initially the students were in home stay around Mirboo North with host families connected to the school or with families formally connected with the school. The students and Assistant Principal loved the small school atmosphere which they described as 'very relaxed' and 'very enjoyable'. The Chinese students and their host students enjoyed a day at Philip Island where they engaged the Antarctic Experience at the Nobbies and the Koala Sanctuary. Fish and chips on the beach at San Remo was a highlight while the Pelicans were fed.

A particular thank you must go out to the host families and Mrs Tonya Wright (organiser) who did a magnificent job despite some language barriers. On behalf of our school thank you so much for contributing to our international cultural exchange program as this benefits our students by exposing them to different cultures and philosophies of education. Students were astonished to find out the Chinese students go to school from 7am to 9pm and then study afterwards. I think our students going on exchange to Jiangshu later in the term may be in for a shock!

Information nights were run by both our Junior and Senior School and were well attended on Wednesday. As I have always said one of the strengths of our school is the value our families place on education. This was highlighted on this evening.

A special thank you to the staff who attended and assisted in the preparation for this evening it really assists parents and students to make the best choice they can for their education in future years. We also had representatives from Gippsland TAFE and Tanya Nelson from The Headstart program on the evening ensuring that parents and students seeking these pathways were well informed.

School Council have been very busy early in the term. As you will be aware with the upcoming closure of Ridgeway Discounts (our uniform supplier) this has brought some uncertainty to the distribution of our school uniform.

The school has now taken over distribution of school uniform, however it will take some time set up this system. We will notify our community during term 4 when new uniform can be purchased, from where and on what days. Uniform is also undergoing a review. A school council subcommittee has been set up to address this headed by Cara Mahoney. Students, Parents and Staff are being canvassed for their opinion. Watch this space for any addition or alterations to the school uniform. I would like to take this opportunity to thank. Kelly and Steven for their ongoing support and wish them the best for future endeavours.

The Council have also been busy concluding the new School Strategic Plan (SSP). This sets out the direction of the school for the next 4 years. Months of work have culminated in its finalization by staff, students and parents. To those who have been involved I thank you as your input is valued and appreciated. The next stage of this is to develop a year by year plan Annual Implementation Plan or AIP. This will be completed in the coming months for 2020 and involve a similar range of input. Also a huge thank you to parents who have completed the 2019 Parent Opinion Survey. This information along with the Attitudes to School Survey (by students) and the Staff Opinion Survey (by staff) assists us in the development of the plans mentioned above. At last count while writing, we had 40 families fill this survey in which is the most in some years. If you have received an email regarding this please consider filling it in as it is a really valuable tool in improving our school. Thank you to Mrs. Rebecca Woodall for managing this initiative.

A huge congratulations to the Mirboo North Football Teams for making the finals in the Seniors, Under 18s, Under 16's, Youth Girls, Under 14's and Under 12's. Even more remarkable is an amazing effort by the Mirboo North Netball club to get all teams to the finals, well done to the coaches and players. I wish you the best of luck and as always, celebrate responsibly.

Lastly an absolutely incredible effort by Year 12 Student Ben McConachy. Ben recently participated in the National Level School Swimming Carnival, he not only competed in a huge amount of events but was also voted captain of the Victorian team. Ben finished 8<sup>th</sup> in the 100m Breaststroke, 9<sup>th</sup> in the 50m freestyle, 9<sup>th</sup> in the 200m Breaststroke 9<sup>th</sup> in the 50 m Breaststroke. # YEAR 11 - PHYSICS CAMP REPORT

Last term 11 Physics Students journeyed down to Waratah Beach Camp for the third ever Year 11 Physics Camp. With horrific cold and wet weather forecast our brave year 11 Physics Students ventured down to Waratah beach camp for two days of fun filled physics action.

Right at the start we used the break in the rain to take on the Giant swing to obtain acceleration graphs from which they could find the period of the pendulum and calculate its length.

We undertook some egg throwing to demonstrate conservation of momentum and Impulse.

They then tackled a problem solving and team building exercise the "Nitro Crossing" swinging across the river and "Treasure Island".

The expected rain still held off so we were able to enjoy a short time on the beach where we saw a breathtaking rainbow and discussed refraction and wave action. We also used the beach to undertake the drone flying in challenging and windy conditions. Unfortunately Mr Mueller was unable to maintain a safe operating distance between the drone and the ground, resulting in an unexpected forced landing B

The weather finally closed in which meant we had to abort our planned rocket launching. We were

also able to undertake several experiments including motion and light which included an activity based on the Newtons Second Law using the Spark Vue data logging equipment to obtain results of the motion.

After a lovely dinner they enjoyed some popcorn while watching a movie filled with Physics content.

Day two involved some sound and light demonstrations while we avoided the heavy hail which covered the ground.


Finally we travelled home, our heads filled with new knowledge and experiences gained from the opportunities to undertake practical physics outside the classroom.



Calling Gippsland writers

While there are many short story competitions in Australia, prizes for short non-fiction are much rarer.

The Bass Coast Prize for Non-Fiction, launched by author Tom Keneally at the Phillip Island Literary Festival today, is one of the richest competitions for non-fiction in Australia with a total of \$10,000 in prize money. The first prize winner will receive \$5000, second \$3000 and third \$2000.

The prize is open to writers living in, working or attending an educational institution in Gippsland.

Sponsor Phyllis Papps, a Phillip Island writer and activist who has written, compiled or edited some 20 books, says she wants to encourage and support writers of non-fiction in an era of diminishing options for publication.

"I particularly want to support writers in rural/country areas because they don't have the opportunities and networks that writers in urban areas have."

The prize is auspiced by the online magazine *Bass Coast Post*. *Post* editor Catherine Watson says Ms Papps's generous sponsorship makes it one of the richest non-fiction competitions in Australia.

Most importantly, she says, the prize gives Gippsland writers a deadline and a guarantee that their work will be read.

Entries can be in the form of an essay, profile, memoir, long-form journalism or a substantial portion of a book manuscript but they must pertain to the Gippsland region, issues or people. The length is 5000-10,000 words.

Ms Papps and Ms Watson are joined on the judging panel by Geoff Ellis, a Bass Coast councillor, journalist and editor of the *Waterline News*.

Entries close on November 29, 2019 and prize winners will be announced in February 2020.

The winning entries will be published in the *Bass Coast Post* and may be republished as an e-book or hard copy following consultation with the writers.
