## From the Acting Principal



As term 3 continues to march on and the weather gloomy now is a timely reminder about the perils of poor mental health and stress that can play out in our young people and adults alike. I was startled to see the latest suicide rates by age group reported by 'Lifemind Australia' a few weeks ago. It was alarming to see that rates of suicide and attempted suicide has spiked by 15% in 2018 on the age group 14-20. More alarming was the high rate of suicide and attempted suicide of persons over the age of 70. Why is this relevant? What does it mean for us here at MNSC?

At MNSC we work very hard to look after students in our care. Many ongoing programs are put into place so that our staff are in the best place to assist students in crisis or under severe stress. On Thursday this accounted for one of those measures where staff engaged in 'Dealing with Trauma and how to Respond'. This is the reason why students left a little early. This highlights an ongoing commitment by the staff of this school to address welfare needs. Previously staff have engaged in programs such as 'Calmer Classroom's' and 'Trauma informed Practice' in recent years.

Add to this the appointment of interim Chaplain, Jim Barratt, Suzie Jacobs (School Nurse) as well as the year level coordinators, peer support programs and mental health first aid and we form a team that addresses the needs of many students in this school.

However, we are the first to acknowledge that we do not know of all of the students who suffer the effects of trauma and stress. It is vitally important that as a parent, these issues are addressed for your children in the form of seeking a mental health plan from a medical practitioner and then finding appropriate support. At MNSC we are happy to assist you to do this or and will always take your concerns seriously.

Our year 9's on top of this are spending a significant amount of time at Strzelecki House (The Mirboo North Aged Care Facility) working with the aged. The significant boost that this gives to not only the residents when they communicate and engage with our students, but also the reciprocal relationship that it creates for our students who get a significant amount of self-esteem making a real difference in people's lives.

The Student Attitude to School survey has been released by the department. The results are not final and are preliminary only. At this point it is fair to say that there has been a small decline in some areas of our student's engagement in school. Over the coming weeks, staff, students and other members of the community will be sought for consultation to see how we can improve these results. It is important to note that in most areas MNSC is still well above the state average.


The School is in the midst preparing the Annual Implementation Plan (AIP) for the remainder of 2019 and all of 2020. Leadership team members will do this in consultation with stakeholders in the MNSC community. This comes on the back of the work completed by our school community on the School Strategic Plan (SSP) which was finalised recently.

Finally I would like to bid a fond farewell to those students going on the German exchange for 2019. This is always a highlight on the calendar for those involved. I would like to take this opportunity to thank Mrs. Petra Hopkins who work tirelessly on these exchanges every year. She has now qualified the school for the VRQA program meaning that it runs much smoother and is covered by DET insurance and mitigates risk. This took Mrs. Hopkins many weeks and ensures the viability of this program for some time.

# a case of CONSPIRACY?

## FORENSIC SCIENCE WORKSHOP

On Tuesday 30<sup>th</sup> July students in year 9 and 10 were given an insight into the work done by crime scene investigators and forensic scientists. A Forensic Science Workshop incursion was held in the school auditorium where students were presented with a crime scene to solve. They were given information about the suspects and be able to examine the evidence found at the scene. Also on display were the results of tests that were carried out in the Forensic Laboratories to help solve the crime just like a real Forensic Scientist. Students were able put themselves into the role of a Forensic Scientist learning how they process crime scenes to find the vital clues they need to assist a Police investigation. Students learned how fingerprinting, DNA profiling, ballistics, microscopy, trace evidence transfer, gas chromatography can be used to assist in the identification of the murderer. After gathering all the evidence students came up with their suspect. The presenter then tracked through the evidence to show how this crime was actually solved.

This year we have been fortunate to have four girls take part in the STEM Sisters initiative run by the South Gippsland Bass Coast LLEN. The STEM Sisters project aims to raise awareness of opportunities in Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics (STEM) to Year 10 girls to address the problem of low participation rates of girls in STEM subjects and in STEM careers. Our representatives are Emre Cupples, Namatai Douglas, Audrey Crawford and Gemma Tompkins. At the end of last term all four students took part in a 3-day camp focusing on the challenge of raising awareness about the importance of healthy eating and activity for young people in the Latrobe Valley. Through the design thinking process, students developed a prototype that encouraged better eating choices or more physical activity. ## SOUTH GIPPSLAND Gliding Club Inc.

### LA TROBE, SOUTH GIPPSLAND AND VSA JUNIOR GLIDING SCHOLARSHIP SCHEME

The Gliding Federation of Australia Inc (GFA) is the national body regulating the sport of gliding and soaring in Australia. Its mission is *"to drive the development and promotion of the sport of gliding and foster excellence in safe, accessible and enjoyable soaring"*.

The South Gippsland Gliding Club has a 50 year history of gliding and in its time has trained many pilots who have gone on to enjoy the thrill of gliding in particular and aviation as a profession. The La Trobe Valley Gliding Club was established in the same period and flew from the La Trobe Valley Airfield. This Club has now ceased operations and has dedicated its remaining funds to South Gippsland on the proviso that the money be used for *ab initio* gliding training. An annual gliding scholarship aimed at encouraging new people into the sport of gliding by providing scholarship holders with low cost *ab-initio* gliding training. The La Trobe and South Gippsland Scholarship is administered by the South Gippsland Gliding Club and will be awarded to suitable applicants.

In partnership with Victorian Soaring Association (VSA) the aim of this scholarship is to encourage young people to take up gliding. Applicants must have had no previous hands on flying training. The funding from VSA is on the proviso of a commitment from the successful applicants as shown below in Conditions 6 and 8.

The value of this scholarship for 2019/20 is up to \$1500, for gliding training costs. The scholarship does not include GFA or South Gippsland Club membership costs. Detailed scholarship conditions and application process are summarised below.

Applications are now sought for the 2019/20 Gliding Scholarship, for the period December 2019 to 30<sup>th</sup> June 2020. **Applications are to be received no later than midnight on 30<sup>th</sup> September 2019 to the La Trobe, South Gippsland and VSA Scholarship Committee, South Gippsland Gliding Club, PO Box 475, LEONGATHA, VIC, 3953**
