Well done!










STIARKTANK

A Tree Success Story



Graeme Wilson from Delburn had three sons who attended Mirboo North Secondary College- Shane, Shilo and Tommy- and what great lads they are!. Graeme has purchased at least 4 lots of trees- upwards of 4,000, from the school over an 8 year period. The school has sent at least three teams of students out to assist with planting and guarding. He firstly fenced around a large dam and planted around the edges and has gradually added shelter.

This farm is a real test case for the success of our tree project at school. Through careful choice of species and after planting care, Graeme has achieved a great success rate with the schools trees he has purchased-he keeps coming back for more! Graeme pays for the bus to bring the students out to plant and also puts on a bbq at the end of the day. This is great for social interactions. The students learn great skills in teamwork, logistics and horticulture skills. It is rewarding from a teachers perspective to see the students wrestling with the problem of working smarter rather than harder, and being able to eye ball their physical work ethic.


To see trees 6 meters tall that our students planted 8 years ago intermingling with the new ones we are planting in shelter belts is amazing and proof that our project is a vital community service.

Inter School Soccer

In their second game, the girls went down in a nail-biting finish to Mary MacKillop (0-1 in penalty shootout). There were quite a few shots at goal, but some excellent keeping meant we remained scoreless. Despite this loss, the Mirboo North girls have advanced to the next level of competition, mostly by virtue of their score against Wonthaggi. Well done, ladies!!





Gippsland Cross Country

16 of 26 qualifiers made it to annual pilgrimage to Lardner Park. The top 12 progress through to states. First up was the U13 girls. Sienna Cheffers ran her heart out for 16th and Jess Daly 35th. Great to see you both happy to be there and smiling. Darby Kratzat was our sole U13 boy and he did really well to finish 21st. Bianca Fahey ran solidly for 36th in the U14 girls. Determined duo Danny Buissink and Josh Cathie ran hard for 23rd and 39th respectively. Harry Mahoney blew away the hills for a fabulous 12th in the U15 boys. Beau Peters was 44th, and in his words-at least I wasn't last! (there were 4 behind him)

The U16 girls were the stars-3 of them anyway. They won through as a team and should have competed against the other 3 Gippsland districts, but as we were the only full team in attendance they automatically go through to states. So, to the girls who answered the call on Sunday and to Tarmah Little and Josh Hillman who struggled with injury to complete the course to be our 3rd and 4th 16 boy runners- your efforts got us the second place!

Usually the top 15 go through, so we will field a strong contingent of 20 + at Gippsland level. Great work team.

SAFE **BUS TRAVEL**





Welcome on board. Enjoy. Be aware.

- . Leave home with plenty of time to get to the bus stop 10 minutes prior to the scheduled departure time.
- Always walk as far away from the road edge as possible.
- · Do not push others when the bus is approaching the stop.
- If you are using headphones these MUST be removed before leaving the bus as they distract you from being fully aware of danger.
- Make sure you always treat the driver with respect. They have the important job of getting me, you and others to school and home



ROAD USERS - Please slow down and be aware around bus stops. Look out for the lights flashing on the outside of the bus, which means children are leaving or boarding the bus.

Do stand well back when at the bus stop and wait until the bus has completely stopped.

Do wait until the bus moves well away and you can see clearly in both directions, before crossing the road.





Do sit down on your seat quietly and quickly. If there are no seats, move to the back of the bus and use the handgrips on the side.

PARENTS & CARERS - Parking or waiting opposite the bus stop is dangerous and is one of the most frequent causes of accidents at bus stops.

All children, especially little ones, are excited to see you after a day at school and are likely to run across the road to meet you.
